That's right, I'm back. When you read this, spring will finally be here and there are lots of things going on. I won't mention events that LPR advertises in the POST, on the website calendar or in our mid-month email blasts but I would like to let some of you know that if you're NOT getting this information, it's probably because your PCA registered email is not current. Out of LPR's 570 members, I get feedback that 174 of you have undeliverable emails. Many of those are spouses or associate members but a number of them are PCA assigned dummy emails (like 1900086879@pca.org) that PCA assigns when you join without providing an email. Also, a lot of long time members have changed emails since joining and never updated them by logging onto pca.org. If you think you might be missing something, check your pca profile on pca.org or let me or Karen know and we can update it.

Speaking of Porsche club events, at the last Presidents meeting, discussions made it clear that shorter, half day tours are very attractive to folks with busy schedules. That got me to thinking about ways LPR could do more of these. Many of you don't know that all official LPR tours carry a \$10M liability insurance certificate. This doesn't cover your cars but covers LPR and PCA in case something happens. All moving car events including tech sessions carry this insurance. Event organizers and the Safety Chair are also required to file reports with PCA after each event. That's why we have ya'll sign the waiver forms. Tour organizers are required to provide route directions and almost always pre-run the tours to ensure that the roads are OK and the route instuctions are correct. I've done it, as has anyone in LPR that has run a tour. Now here's where I go out on a limb; these pre-runs are not covered by PCA insurance and have little organization. They're usually either run alone or with a couple friends. I've had as much fun on pre-runs as I have on official tours. One of my favorites was when one of our members decided on a short drive to Pescadero for lunch. An email

asking if anyone wanted to go went viral and we had 16 or so cars. Great drive, great day, no pressure!

So when I was thinking about short tours, one thought occurred to me. Maybe some of you have thought about running a tour but don't know what's required or are maybe intimidated at the thought of 20 cars following you around. It doesn't take much to put something simple together: find a date and a couple of people to co-chair the event, I say co-chair because that way there is a backup leader, plus two heads are many times better. Preferrably a club member familiar with touring would volunteer to fill this role. Many of us are retired and would like to help you out. A two hour drive ending at a local restaurant or winery is always fun. If you think you might want to try something like this, contact anyone on the Board or let me know and we'll be glad to help. It's an easy introduction to touring without any obligations. Oh yeah, we won't ask you for gas money or to pay for our lunch either. Probably!

Along those lines, long time member Steve Douglas sent me some suggestions after the Valentine's GTG for some Santa Cruz area activity. Thought I'd pass them along.

Every Saturday morning there is a Cars and Coffee in Soquel, at 41st Ave and Soquel Dr, 7:30am to 9am in the Starbucks parking lot, all kinds of cars sometimes 100 + from early 1900s to the latest super cars. A few Porsches show up regularly.

Here are a few places and ideas that could be utilized for a meeting point/Brunch:

• The Watsonville Airport has Ella's which has both indoor and outdoor seating, good food, parking and if early enough on a weekend there isn't a crowd, plus the owner is a 356 enthusiast.

• The Point, which is in Capitola, but considered the Pleasure Point area, does a nice breakfast starting at 10am, their own parking lot, and Josh the owner would gladly make a group seating and gear up for a small crowd.

• Johnny's Harborside at the Santa Cruz Harbor, just up from the Crows Nest, they also open at 10am, have great food, nice views and parking.

• These places would need a call ahead, but with a 9:45 gathering and 10 a.m. invasion of the restaurant, we could take over. It's always nice to do RSVP format so there is less of a surprise. • In Scotts Valley, right at the Highway #17 and Mt. Herman exit is Surf City Coffee, parking early is good, crowded a bit later, it's good meeting point, normally just before the Highway 17 traffic backup, and there are three good back roads from there to get into the mountains, for a nice drive.

• Lots of places to visit in the "Mountains": wineries, breweries, oddball places like the Big Foot Museum, or Steve Antique Trail Museum. Big Basin State Park for a short hike/picnic. Mystery Spot was a big hit with LPR tour done years ago as was Roaring Camp. There is always the growing westside of Santa Cruz, with several wineries, breweries, eateries, art studios, and they are all within a walking distance, park and enjoy the afternoon.

• Ben Lomond has a fun place, well actually two; Mountain Feed and Farm Supply, which is really an eclectic mix of nursery, farm, home cooking, canning, food preservation, yard art, and crafts. Then next door is the Tyrollean Inn, which is a German restaurant.

• And then there is always Gizdich Ranch for pie and berries, and Corrolitos Market for smoked meats and sausages.

On December 18th of last year, in the state of Washington, an Amtrak train derailment onto Interstate 5 resulted in 3 deaths and 70 injuries as well as caused \$40 million in damage. Incredible as it may seem, it has been predicted that it will be over a year before we understand what caused the accident. Really? A year? It is already known that the train was traveling at 80 miles per hour in a 30 mph zone on the track. But, we are a nation of bureaucracies and bureaucracies must have their due. The National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) is in charge of this investigation and this is why it will take a year, likely cost the taxpayer many millions more dollars and probably produce little useful results with its predictable conclusion being that trains should travel at posted speed limits with the engineers supervised by the undistractable dilligence of a computer.

A preliminary report issued by the NTSB states that a review of the train's video recorders shows the engineer commenting about "an over speed condition" six seconds before the actual crash. If you think about it, in what is perceived as an over speed situation, six seconds is an eternity, and yet the emergency brake was not engaged. The report also states "the crew was not observed to use any personal electronic devices during the time frame reviewed."

While a nation ruled by bureaucracies, we are also one that is generous with forgiveness. One can't help but wonder sometimes if we aren't too forgiving. No matter his culpability, unless blood tests show that the engineer was DUI or the engine cabin video shows him playing a non-electronic game of Tiddlywinks with the conductor at the time of the accident, his railroad workers union, also a bureaucracy, will likely ensure that he will retain his job.

It is easy to be Draconian in judging the engineer in this situation. When you are operating a train in motion you quite literally have just one responsibility under your direct control... the speed of the train. You can't drive around obstructions and you can't really stop for one. The 30 MPH speed limit was posted 2 miles POST Positions..

prior to the curve where the engine and several passenger cars derailed onto the highway. I suspect that the emergency brake was not engaged because that would create a recordable action that might reflect poorly on an engineer and it was his hope he could slow and make the curve without affecting his job record. In other words, safety was not his primary concern.

It would seem that the responsibility would rest squarely on the back of the engineer but, I am sure, he is already lawyered up with some palliating prodigy and, as of two weeks after the accident, "unable to be interviewed due to his injuries." I can hear the excuses now; "My client was insufficiently trained. The route was not properly designed. The speed signage was insufficient. There was pressure to open the new route quickly causing lapses in safe-ty..." on ad infinitum.

It's going to be interesting to see how it finally plays out and to see whether, despite our forgiving nature, the engineer, or any other individual, is singled out as being responsible for the deaths, injuries and property damage that were the result of this tragedy. And in this age of computerized automation and development of self-driving vehicles, when the report states that a computer's guidance is necessary to avoid these accidents in the future, we can look forward to the irony of the railroad engineer's union assertion that a computer alone won't cut it; in the interest of safety, there should be an engineer driving the train.
