# POST Positions

Down syndrome is a genetic disorder that causes physical and mental abnormalities in an offspring and has no known cause. The likelihood of a mother giving birth to a child with this disorder advances from a low of less than .1% to a high of 3% as the mother ages. There are approximately 400,000 (.001% of the population) people in the United States that have this condition and it is estimated that only 20% attain employment and a survey indicated that only 3% work full time. There are a number of national organizations serving as advocates for rights and research associated with this condition, as well as hundreds of smaller, local organizations with the same function. These groups have been so effective that the baby food manufacturer Gerber just announced that the new Gerber baby is a Down syndrome baby.

Down syndrome can be identified in a fetus using prenatal screening and a positive in the test is a generally accepted basis for terminating a pregnancy. In the United States, from 1995 to 2011, the termination rate after a positive test was 67%. In the nation of Iceland the termination rate is near 100%.

There is an interesting development taking place in the state of Pennsylvania that directly applies to what I would call "the Down Syndrome Community". A bill working its way through the legislature that would ban abortions based on the possibility of the child being born with Down syndrome. Advocates for the bill, of course from the Down Syndrome Comunity, have likened the wholesale aborting of Down syndrome fetuses to eliminating homelessness by killing the homeless. On its face, the bill would seem to be an attempt to protect a disadvantaged class of people, which is commonly a progressive goal. But what is really going on is another conservative attempt to chip away at a woman's right to choose. That is why the bill is moving through a Republican dominated legislature and is promised to be vetoed by Pennsylvania's Democratic governor, Tom Wolf.

#### \* POST Positions..

I have to say that I have two strong opinions about abortion and two only. One is that I don't think that a man has a right to tell a woman what she can and can't do with her own body. The other is that I don't think women should be granted a legal "right" to abortion because, cynic that I am, I know that there will be a segment of women who will comport themselves irresponsibly and look upon abortion as a first line of defense against pregnancy because, since it is a right, they can demand them at will and suffer no financial consequence. So in my opinion, the government should just butt out.

This battle over abortion has been a major subject in politics for my entire adult life. Concurrently, a similar controversy has raged with progressive's unchanging focus on chipping away at the second amendment's definition of the right to own guns. A distillation of the two arguments is that the conservatives say abortion kills babies and liberals say guns kill people. These two groups will never see eye-to-eye and one of the results of the constant carping at their opponents is that the ill will that results leaves no inclination to agree on anything and nothing gets done.




