I am honored to announce that I have been appointed by PCA's Executive Council to replace Sandy Provasi as your new Zone 7 Rep for the 2019-2020 term. Sandy has done a fabulous job over the last 3-1/2 years as our Zone Rep. With 20 plus years of PCA experience and the help of her equally experienced husband, Tom, I will have a tough act to follow. I would very much like to thank Sandy for her service and hope that I can continue in her footsteps.

I have been a member of PCA and the Sacramento Valley Region since 2007 when I became actively involved in the region's autocross program. Several years after joining, I served as the club's autocross chair from 2012 to 2013 and again for one year in 2017. My regional board experience includes serving as the club's competition and safety chair from 2014-2015 and club president from 2015 to 2016. In 2016 the Sacramento Valley Region was selected as the PCA Region of the Year. For the past two years I have served as the club's past president as well as on our newsletter committee that publishes the award winning newsletter, the Drifter. I also served as the Zone 7 autocross chair in 2018.

The National Bylaws state the Zone Reps are "responsible for the welfare and progress of the Regions within their zones". In fact, the Zone Reps are a bridge or liaison between the National and local organizations, working on behalf of the Regions and their members to enhance the membership experience, and to avail the Regions of opportunities offered through PCA. The Zone Rep position was originally created in 1969, when the Executive Council (EC) realized the club had grown too big for them to have direct relationships with all the Regions. They subdivided the country, aggregating the Regions into groups which evolved over time into the 14 Zones we now have. Each Zone has a Zone Rep, a position created to facilitate communication between the EC and the Region Officers.

The Zone Reps are emphatically not "Zone Presidents"; they do not direct or oversee Region Presidents. Rather they are a communications and management resource for the Regions in their Zone, and communicate the Region's interests at the National level as appropriate.

The Zone 7 volunteer board consists of the Zone Rep, a secretary and a treasurer who each serve 2 year terms. The zone secretary and treasurer are approved by the presidents of the regions. The volunteer zone board members include, Rik Larson, Secretary, Larry Adams, Interim Treasurer, Richard Chew, Webmaster, John D'Angelo, Concours Chair, and Grady Carter, Autocross Chair.

The 10 regions which comprise Zone 7 include Redwood, Shasta, Sequoia, Sierra Nevada, Golden Gate, Loma Prieta, Sacramento Valley, Diablo, Monterey Bay, and Yosemite. As all of the regions begin their planning process for 2019, I will use this column to inform you of zone wide events that range from our yearly Zone 7 Tour, Concours and Autocross Series. 2019 Zone 7 Tour Overview June 6-10, 2019

This is the well-known Shasta Four Day Tour through the mountains, valleys and scenic by-ways of Shasta, Trinity, Siskiyou, Tehama, and Lassen Counties. It is similar to the Tour held in 2018 which received high ratings. Participation is limited to PCA Zone 7 Members, and you must drive your later model Porsche. We require your vehicle to be in good condition, and recently serviced, since we travel at elevations as high as 6500 feet and we must be able to pass slow moving vehicles as a Group. Touring is a special skill set, so we will ask that you rank yourself as to your experience, so we can place you appropriately within your group, for safety purposes.

Each day involves about six hours of "seat time", so you will get to enjoy what your car was made to do---perform at its best, both using its power and its handling ability. You will be part of an 18 member team, with an experienced Lead Driver, a Sweep Driver and a Relay in the middle. We also require the use of two-way radios so that we can maintain constant communications. The end result is that we travel "as one", yet at speeds that are at the maximum of safety.

Redding is situated at the juncture of the Sierras, the Coastal Range and the Cascades. So each of the first three mornings, you will Tour with your group an average of 260 miles into these mountain ranges. The fourth morning you will check out of the Hotel, and take a short, 80 mile "roller coaster" Tour that drops you off on Interstate 5 for your ride back home.

TOTAL DRIVE TIME AND DISTANCE, Approximately 20:00 857 miles.

Your fee is based on either "One Person Per Car" or "Two Persons Per Car." It includes all fees, Tour costs, and meals (arrival day dinner is not included). Lunch is "on the road"; dinner is a banquet at the Host Hotel. We provide a breakfast buffet if you stay at the Host. You will, of course, book and pay for your own room separately. There is a block of rooms at a negotiated and discounted rate. This is a "LEED" (Green Certified) Facility.

This is a Charitable Event and any excess proceeds from the Tour will be donated to local charities.

Registration opens on January 28, 2019 at 7:00 am on MotorSportReg.com. You might consider having your Account created on that site in advance to be prepared. Last year, this Tour "Sold Out" in 90 minutes. For Sale:

A very rare find: A single "family/owner", 1963 356B. This beautiful example of Porsche craftsmanship was purchased new from Anderson Behel in San Jose by Raymond Craft in 1963 and then was gifted to his daughter Jane in 1966 when she entered college at Santa Barbara. (We should all be so lucky!) Jane's then boyfriend (now husband) Peter, lived in SF and early miles were accumulated making the 650 mile weekend round trip. Jane named the car "Buzzi" for the exhilarating feeling it gave her on these long drive. Even though it has vanity plates today, she has the original yellow on black plates that came with the car.

Although driven out of state occasionally, this car has remained a permanent resident of the salt free state of California all these years; maybe not a one of a kind in that regard, but close to it. No accidents and more importantly, no rust! Jane has the original bill of sale from Anderson Behel and the original window sticker and most of the maintenance records.

The vehicle has been driven consistently but sparingly all these years. Service history includes Modderman Service, Reitmeir's Werkstatt and RMG Porsche Sepcialists. This exceptionally low mileage, original engine (yes, of course, the serial numbers match!) is a true keepsake and Jane would be keeping Buzzi not for the fact that she and Peter are now downsizing and leaving their lovely home in Los Altos.

As with any 55 year old car, Buzzi needed and received a fresh coat of paint in 1992 and both the interior upholstery and carpet have been redone professionally with loving care.
